William Hicks aged about <sup>65</sup> Sixty five  
States on oath that he enlisted in the  
12<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment an Continental  
Establishment in Capt William Hicks  
under the command of <sup>Colo James Wood</sup> Colo James Wood  
company on or about the 20<sup>th</sup> day of  
September 1776, and served out his time  
for the term of two years

in the Corps of Artillery at the mouth of  
the great Kanawha and was regularly  
discharged in the fall of the year 1778

the discharge given to him by Capt Hicks  
he states is either lost or deposited in  
some of the offices at Richmond  
in Virginia, he further states that

some time in the year 1780 he again  
engaged in the second Virginia  
Detachment under the command  
of Colo Hanes and in Capt F. Coward  
company and served the term of eight  
months and was discharged from  
the same on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of June 1782

as will more fully appear by the  
original discharge herewith filed  
and dated the 17<sup>th</sup> day of Sept 1782

he further says that during his service  
he suffered much from exposure as  
well as in battle having served the  
whole Campaign under great  
to the faith he further says that  
his circumstances are such as to render  
personal labour on his part necessary  
to obtain the means of subsistence, and  
his age and infirmity plead out  
of his power to do much he therefore  
says that he stands in need of the  
aid and assistance of his Country to  
render his latter days still comfortable

aged 60 years, resident in Garrard County, in said district, [Circuit, County, or corporation] who, being first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows: (c)

He enlisted with Capt. Mellicam Miller in 1775 in the 1<sup>st</sup> Regt Virginia Regt for two years on Continental establishment and served on his term and obtained an honorable discharge which he bore.

And I do solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be,) that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts, or debts, due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed. 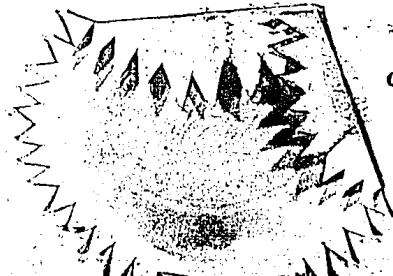

State of Kentucky, Ippamino County, et.

On this 19th day of November next ten hundred and thirty eight personally appeared before the County Court of Ippamino County and state of aforesaid Mary Dix a resident of said County of Ippamino aged about seventy two years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on this oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 7-1838, entitled "An act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows" that she is the widow of William Dix deceased who was a private soldier in the army of the revolution in the regular service, and as such drew a pension of ninety six dollars per annum for some time before and until his death from the United States at their agency in Lexington Kentucky - She further declares that she was married to the said William Dix deceased in the winter time, two or three years after the service of her said husband had been rendered, but in what month or year she does not now recollect, she knows however it was more than fifty years ago - Her said husband, William Dix, died in the month of October, this last October sixteen years ago, which she is told was in the year 1822; that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first day of January next ten hundred and ninety four viz. at the time above stated - She further states that she is wholly illiterate, and her memory is failing her, but the above statements are true as stated - Sworn to and subscribed on the day

The deposition of Siffiah Combs of Spanish  
County, aged forty eight years, who being first duly  
sworn upon oath states that she is the fourth child  
of William Hise dead and her mother Mary Hise,  
who she subscribed and sworn to the foregoing declara-  
tion that she is to the best of her knowledge and be-  
lief, and from what she has always understood, now  
about forty eight years old that from her earliest  
recollection her said father and mother lived together  
as man and wife, and now universally recognized  
as such by those who know them, without any  
question ever having been made as to the legitimacy  
of their marriage. Her father died in the month  
of October 1822, according to the best of her recol-  
lection, and drew a pension from the United  
States at their agency in Lexington, Kentucky,  
till his death. Her mother, the said Mary Hise,  
is the surviving widow of said William Hise  
dead and has remained unmarried since his death  
as aforesaid. She is certain, upon reflection, from  
the death of her own husband, that the above stat-  
ment as to the time of the death of her father,

The foregoing deposition of Siffiah  
Combs of Spanish County was this day taken, subscribed

The deposition of Sufferah Childs of Jessamine County Ky taken at her residence on the 7<sup>th</sup> day of May 1839 to be used as evidence in favour of the application of Mrs Mary Reichs widow of William Reichs M.D. for a pension under the act of Congress passed July 7-1838.

Deponent being forty eight years old on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of September last. Depoeth and saith that she is the fourth Child of William Reichs and Mary Reichs (whose name before marriage was ~~Elizabeth~~ Leveager)

She further saith that she has her Father's old Pocket book now in her possession which book contains the family register of the marriage of her Father & Mother and the age of their Children. Said register occupying part of two pages. The said register is in the hand writing of the deponents Father and has been there from the deponents earliest recollection. On the right hand page is first some old accounts and nearly middle way down is entered The Marriage of the deponents Father and Mother but too dim now to make out except the Month and year they were married which appears to be January the 2<sup>nd</sup> 1784 and immediately below is entered the age of their Sixth & Seventh Children in these words to wit William Reichs was born December 24-1894. Abagel Reichs was born the May the 20-1896. The left hand page also commences with some old accounts and near half way down there is an entry (but not entirely legible) of the age of the said William & Mary Reichs Second Child (the first as the deponent has always understood died at about three months old). This entry seems to make their Second Child Moses Reichs to have been born September the 7 1786 the Third Child age is legible and in these words viz, Abraham Reichs son to William & Mary Reichs born the 30<sup>th</sup> <sup>October</sup> September 1788. The next is the deponents own age which stands thus Sufferah Reichs was born Sept the 20-1890 and then comes the name and age of the fifth Child of the said William and Mary Reichs which stands thus Samuel Reichs was born the 16-1892 January. All of which entries as specified in said family register was legible when the deponent first recollects of seeing them which was many years

prior to his father's death; But it will be observed that the deponent's father has made a very obvious mistake in putting down the year of all of the children except the two first to wit Moses & Abraham. The deponent's father, having made use of 1890 V6 in the place of 1790 V6. And with this correction she the deponent firmly believes, from every information she has received from her father and mother and from other sources that the whole of said register is perfectly correct. The deponent further saith that she knows the said pocket book containing said register was her father's and in his possession many years before his death; Her father the said William Weeks died in October 1822 at which time the said pocket & register came into the possession of the deponent's husband Edward Condit and continued in his possession until his death in October 1825 at which time the said book containing said register came into the hands of the deponent and has remained in her possession ever since up to the present period; Which register as she says described by her she makes part of this her depository And further saith that

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information in regard to Mary Hicks, a pensioner of Kentucky in 1840, for service of her husband in the Revolutionary War.

The data given herein are found in the papers on file in pension claim, W. 6931, based upon service of William Hicks in the Revolutionary War. His widow, Mary Hicks, was a pensioner of Jessamine County, Kentucky, in 1840.

William Hicks enlisted September 30, 1776 and served two years as a private in Captain William McKee's company, Colonel James Wood's 13<sup>th</sup> Virginia regiment. He enlisted in 1780, served eighteen months as Corporal in Captain F. Cowherd's company in a detachment of the 2<sup>d</sup> Virginia regiment, commanded by Colonel Harts, was in General Green's campaign, and was discharged January 17, 1783.

William Hicks was allowed pension on his application executed June 30, 1818, at which time he resided in Garrard County, Kentucky. He was aged then about sixty-two years; the date and place of his birth are not shown, nor the names of his parents, nor his residence at the time he enlisted in the Revolutionary War.

An official report on file shows that the above noted pensioner died December 19, 1822, in Garrard County, Kentucky.

William Hicks married January 2, 1784, Mary Gangeff; the date and place of her birth and the names of her parents are not shown.

Mary Hicks, the soldier's widow, was allowed pension on her

application executed November 19, 1838. She was then a resident of Jessamine County, Kentucky, aged seventy-two years.

An official report on file shows that Mary Hicks, soldier's widow, died August 24, 1847, in Jessamine County, Kentucky.

In November 1838, Suffiah Combs, a daughter of the soldier, William Hicks, and his wife, Mary, was a resident of Jessamine County, Kentucky; she was born September 20, 1790 and was her parents' fourth child. Her husband, Edward Combs, died in October 1835.

The following data pertaining to other children of the soldier are shown: the first child, name not given, died when about three months old; Moses, the next child, was born September 7, 1788; Abraham was born October 30, 1788; Samuel was born January 16, 1793; William was born December 4, 1794; Abigail was born May 20, 1796.

In 1843, William Hicks was with Mary Hicks, the widow, in Jessamine County, Kentucky. It was not stated, however, that he was the son, William.
